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Ventilation and Infection Control in Healthcare



Proper ventilation is an essential tool to stop the spread of germs. Every time we breathe, we release respiratory droplets into the air. These droplets can be harmless or carry infectious germs like viruses. Respiratory droplets are just one of many particles in the air around us. Other air particles can come from routinely cleaning, walking on a carpet, and even moving our clothes. We routinely use many items in healthcare, like mechanical devices, including toilets and heater/cooler devices in operating rooms, which can release particles into the air.

Well-maintained ventilation systems will remove particles from the air we shouldn't breathe in by pulling old air out of the room and mixing clean air in, which, together with other infection control actions, helps prevent the spread of germs.
